CLASSICS COME TO RUTHMERE



Gleaming chrome. Highly buffed paint job. Power under the hood. On April 30, looking in every way as they did in their heyday, eleven classic cars of the 50's and 60's pulled into the Grove Street driveway at Ruthmere Museum. They made their way around the back, under the porte-cochere, ready to nose their way onto Beardsley Avenue when it was time to leave. The drivers of these cars were members of the Great Lakes Region Vintage Chevrolet Car Club of America on a three-day jaunt to points of interest in northern Indiana, Ruthmere being one of them.

This group – from the Chicago area and its suburbs – meets every month to glean and share information about the care and maintenance of

their cars. They also enjoy the social interaction of road trips in their restored cars to rallies, competitions and car shows. One of the tenets of the club is that the car being restored has to be older than a 1975 model; the oldest car in their club, although not on this trip, is one dating back to 1937.

Hidden Treasures of Ruthmere

Some time ago Robert Beardsley wrote for our newsletter an article entitled "Little Things Mean a Lot," which described some of the treasures of Ruthmere that are not on display, but still make up part of Ruthmere's enormous inventory.

This spring our seminar series will display some of those "little things" that mean a lot but may be hidden from view: "Secret Treasures of Ruthmere." On three consecutive Wednesdays starting May 5, the staff and one guest lecturer will display and discuss items on each of the three floors of the museum that are not obvious to the public, either because they are not on display or because they are not emphasized on tours.

For example, the first program will include pieces of Beardsley jewelry, including a diamond pin often worn by Elizabeth, Helen Beardsley's amethyst suite, and Midge Beardsley's rubies, as well as others. At the same time the Beardsley furs will be on display and the Roosevelt items from the collection will also be on display. See "Robert

Recalls" for more on that subject. Wine and cheese will be served.

The second program introduces a guest artist from Goshen College who will discuss the artwork of William Morris Hunt and Samuel F. B. Morse. Master Gardener Pam McIntyre will lead the third program in the garden; she will discuss the planting and care of the Ruthmere gardens and this year's design for the quilt garden.

The public is invited to these programs where refreshments will be served.

In reference to Ruthmere's spring programs, we are running an article written by Robert Beardsley for our Fall, 2004 Ruthmere Record.

In 1960 the Republican National Convention was held in Chicago in August. My father, Walter Beardsley, as National Republican Committeeman from Indiana was there, naturally, and I tagged along as his guest. Notable Indiana politicos of the day United States Senators Homer E. Capehart and Bill Jenner and Representative Charlie Halleck were there along with other names from the past like Senators Everett Dirksen of Illinois and Robert Taft from Ohio. (Taft got stuck in the freight elevator at the Hotel Elkhart trying to sneak up to an Athenian Room reception in the early 1950s. The dignified senator clambering out of it was some sight.)

Here I also met Governor Nelson Rockefeller of New York, who ran against Nixon for the nomination in 1960 and again in 1964, and his lovely wife, Mary Todd Hunter Rockefeller, who seemed above it all even then. The governor worked hard for Walter's vote; he did not get it despite making a staunch supporter out of me. He had a way of smiling and winking at you at the same time so I knew he HAD to be the better man, but I didn't have a vote.

Conventions were fun and dramapacked events in those days, where the great and near-great from across the country politicked around the clock. The "receptions" everywhere were really nothing but never-ending cocktail parties, and everybody fought to get invited. And those who weren't crashed. Former Elkhartans Dick and Helen Snideman had a suite at the Ambassador East Hotel on the Near North Side (Irv Kupcinet was probably down in the Pump Room that night doing radio interviews of VIPs), and a lot of fancy people showed up. Coat-tailing Walter, I managed to meet most of them, including Richard M. Nixon, who managed a big hello until Dad started talking to somebody else; suddenly I was toast.

Across the room in a window-seat in a corner, I saw an erect and very alert little lady I was sure I knew. At the time she was about 77 years old. Her signature lacquered black straw hat with the dark blue silk band, the Liberty blue-and-white shirtwaist dress with a wide black patent leather belt, and the single strand of pearls told me everything. I was about to meet Alice Roosevelt Longworth, Teddy's famous daughter, about whom he said when asked what he could do to keep Alice under control: "I can either run Alice or I can run the country, but I can't do both!"

She stood. We were introduced. "Well, young man, tell me about yourself!" Her hand shake was firm and she held on. She looked me right in the eyes, and I felt I was being

asked to explain myself. She radiated energy and was no-nonsense and absolutely charming at the same time. She also had a wicked sense of humor. Nobody was spared, including me, although she had me laughing in seconds.

I think we talked about 20 minutes. At that time my political hero was Theodore Roosevelt (still is) and I had a lot to say about him and questions to ask; who better to ask than Alice! She told me about life in Oyster Bay, Long Island, growing up, her life as wife of the Speaker of the House Nicholas Longworth (See Crowded Hours, 1933), and what she thought of Woodrow Wilson and his wife Edith Galt Wilson (not printable).

Soon someone rudely interrupted my enchantment (I can't remember who), but she sent me on my very happy way with a hearty clap on my back and wished me well. What a lady!

Some years later I found in an autograph shop a reprint of the famous photograph of Alice taken about 1906, the year of her marriage. She had written on the photo, which Ruthmere owns today. "Here is the old girl 50 years after this picture was took!" That picture now hangs in the china room next to an autographed photo of Teddy Roosevelt.

In later years I met Eleanor Roosevelt, a great lady, but for me the best of them all was Alice. She was "Alice Blue Gown" all the way.



Havilah Beardsley House Renovation Update

Some work continues on the Havilah Beardsley House renovation. A new door is being installed for the new gallery area in the east wing of the house. A window in this area of the house was removed and filled in with brick.. Once the new door and sidewalk are installed the gallery will be available for use. The Foundation plans to hold its May Board meeting in the gallery area. Other improvements to the house are in planning stages at this time. Additional funding will have to be raised before any additional renovations can take place. Strategy planning is underway to formulate plans for funding this ongoing project into the future.



RUTHMERE PLACES IN ARRAY OF ELEGANCE

On April 23 Ruthmere participated in the Eighth Annual Array of Elegance, a luncheon/fashion show sponsored by Elkhart General Hospital Auxiliary, which features a competition in tablescape design.

This year's site was the Matterhorn Conference Center, where Ruthmere was pleased to place second among thirteen beautiful designs. Our table featured clear amethyst plates and silver from the Ruthmere collection displayed on a lovely tulip quilt designed and handcrafted by Sally Roll to call attention to the tulip design which our gardeners have chosen for the theme of this year's quilt garden..

Winter Projects At Ruthmere

As most of you know, Ruthmere Museum is closed from January 1 to March 31 each year. During this period, while the museum is closed to the public, the staff continues to be busy with projects to prepare for the next season. On a regular schedule different sections of the house are cleaned thoroughly. This past winter the first floor was cleaned. All the woodwork was waxed, the lace curtains were sent out for professional cleaning, windows cleaned, humidifiers placed to keep the humidity levels correct, and all museum artifacts evaluated and inventoried. In addition, this past winter a painting in the library, the Madonna della Sedia, was sent out for cleaning. This particular painting had not been removed from the wall since it had been hung nearly 100 years ago. You could see the fading of the silk wall coverings around the protected area behind the painting. The Hudson Valley painting was reframed due to slippage

in the frame. It is now secure and in good condition. A technician from the Bunn Minnick Organ company from Columbus, Ohio, was asked to do a preliminary review of the Choralcelo instrument in the foyer. A complete evaluation is going to be scheduled soon to us give us costs for repairs and possible upgrades.

Since the house's entire electrical system had not been evaluated since the house was renovated 40 years ago, L&M electric was asked to come in and evaluate the electrical system throughout the entire house. This project has just been completed . We will soon be getting a report to update us on any electrical issues that must be addressed. L&M Electric had not been involved with the museum in the past. We thought a new set of eyes looking at the house would be a good idea.

Several other evaluations are in progress with reports to come in the near

future. Architect Eric Leedy has been contracted to help determine courses of actions regarding structural issues.. The greenhouse roof is being examined for structural integrity, and several foundation issues around the house are being evaluated. Eric will be providing a report letting us know what emergency issues must be addressed, what issues must be addressed in the near future, and possible suggestions for preventative maintenance programs for the exterior of the house which will protect the structure in the future. He also provided us with a garden plan for the area around the new angel statue.

Now that Creek House is empty with Laurels departure the house is being thourghly cleaned and prepared for interior painting. We want the house to be ready when the new Executive Director is hired.

STAFFING CHANGES AT RUTHMERE

In December of 2009 the Ruthmere Board of Directors began the search for a new Executive Director. Laurel Spencer Forsythe had just resigned her position as Executive Director due to personal issues. In order to provide leadership at the museum and to handle day to day operations through this transition period Robert Beardsley hired Bob Edel to manage the facilities and serve as Interim Executive Director until a new Executive Director could be found. Bob had recently

retired from the City of Elkhart as their Director of Parks and Cultural Resources and was available to fill the position.

Additionally, Megan Richards, Ruthmere's Administrative Assistant resigned her position in November to move from the Elkhart area. Laura Horst was hired in February to fill this position. Laura is a graduate of Goshen College with a degree in Fine Arts. She served as Executive Director of a Regional Arts organization in Southwestern Montana until her return to the Elkhart area. Laura's husband Randy is a Professor of Art at Goshen College.

The search committee, comprised of Robert Beardsley, Susan Edwards, Alice Martin, and George Freese has been interviewing prospective candidates for the Executive Director position since the first of the year and are getting close to making decision. The new Executive Director should be in place by the first of June.
